Fall 2006 Gala Honors Former Board Chair, Kyung Yoon, for Her Years of Service to NYAWC

The New York Asian Women's Center celebrated its 24th anniversary with a fall benefit gala on October 12, 2006, at the Prince George Ballroom in Manhattan. In true gala style, more than 300 guests had a grand time, all in support of ending domestic violence. With many donations, a silent auction, and a raffle, the event raised more than \$120,000.

The evening started with an appearance by anchorwoman Connie Chung as Mistress of Ceremonies. Additionally, other prominent Asian American television journalists were present, such as Juju Chang, Cindy Hsu, and Ti-Hua Chang. As the night went on, entertainment was provided by Woody Pak (composer of the musical version of Ang Lee's *The Wedding Banquet* and *The Grace Lee Project*), and Julie Danao.

This year's event honored Kyung Yoon, who recently stepped down as board chair. Throughout her more than a decade of service to NYAWC, Kyung has raised awareness and support in the Asian American community in the fight against domestic violence. She has been a tireless advocate for the rights of women and children for them to govern their own lives, free from abuse. Under her leadership, NYAWC has grown in its influence and capacity, more than quadrupling its budget, staffing, and shelter space. One of the highlights of the gala was bestowing on Kyung the Phoenix Award for Service, given to those who have significantly raised awareness about domestic violence and have made an impact on combating violence against women.

Throughout the awards, speeches, and entertainment, the guests visited the silent auction tables and the raffle table in hopes of winning one of many prizes. Thanks to the sponsors and the guests, the gala auction and raffle combined raised over \$120,000 for the New York Asian Women's Center!

On December 5, 2006, the Board of the New York Asian Women's Center hosted an evening of cocktails, appetizers and conversation. Board member Joan R. Cheng gave updates on recent NYAWC accomplishments and upcoming initiatives. A client shared her emotional story of domestic abuse and how she felt reborn with the help of the center. The client also showed beautiful jewelry that she made. Many eyes were teary and joyful in the room.

Literacy Software Donation

IBM has chosen NYAWC as a recipient of a new Web-based software that uses voice recognition technology to help children and adults learn how to read. The software will be installed on com-NYAWC's puters at OurSpace Community Center. With this software, clients will be able to access the Reading Companion Web site, which contains a library of more than 130 ebooks that cover a range of reading levels and topics, including job search and employment basics, citizenship examination, and financial literacy. As a student reads an e-book, the software analyzes the user's voice and gives audio feedback on pronunciation and accuracy. It also tracks students' progress.

With this program, volunteers will work with clients to develop a reading curriculum appropriate for them.

Ellen Chin

In Ellen Chin's 18 years of volunteering for the New York Asian Women's Center, she has shared her home with women escaping their violent situations, babysat children, and provided support to women in crisis over the 24-hour hotline.

Ellen draws strength and dedication from her own experience as a survivor of domestic abuse and her faith in God. She says that by helping other women, she also helps herself heal and grow. Fluent in Toishanese, a dialect of Cantonese, Ellen is able to reach out to those for whom English is not a native language.

She remembers one particularly rewarding experience. She had developed a close relationship with a family who was living at the center's first shelter. After they left the shelter, Ellen would see them at the annual picnic and other NYAWC events. With each passing year, the family blossomed and looked happier and stronger. "It's powerful, just knowing that women can carry on and have wonderful lives."

Alyssa Elser

Alyssa Elser first began to volunteer at OurSpace as an ESL teacher, mostly for beginners from China. Alyssa has had first-hand experience with learning a foreign language when she studied Mandarin. She also attended the Mandarin Training Center at National Taiwan Normal University in Taipei, Taiwan, for a year. Alyssa currently works for the Taiwanese government.

Alyssa believes it is important for communities to help the disenfranchised help themselves. Her favorite parts of volun-

teering are, "seeing clients gain confidence as their English skills improve, seeing their faces light up as they realize they understand something new, watching a child go from being shy around a stranger to outgoing and eager to communicate in a language he or she is still learning." She looks forward to continuing her volunteer activities.

Art Exhibit Features the Faces of NYAWC

A group of NYAWC clients and its employees were selected to be a part of a traveling art installation. LivingPortrait is an audio-visual installation that gives voice to the women in the Asian immigrant community who are working each day to break the cycle of domestic violence. The artists, composer Woody Pak and new media artists Heather Greer and Liubo Borisov, hope to raise awareness about domestic violence with their collaboration.

The installation combines visual and audio elements. The visual portions include photographs and video that are woven into a mosaic of images projected onto a screen. Interviews that have been edited into musical compositions comprise the audio portions. At each location, the traveling exhibit collects new stories and images to add to the existing project, thus giving each installation location an exclusive version of the project and making the installation a "living" sculpture.

The composition reflects the struggles endured by these women, the courage they displayed in leaving their abusive relationships, and the empowerment they ultimately feel in breaking the cycle of domestic violence.

The installation debuted at the NYAWC's Benefit Gala in New York in Oct. 2006.

Guests then gathered around the tree and got their pictures taken with Santa, taking home souvenirs to remember the day of celebration, fun, and sharing.


