OUT OF THE DARKNESS, INTO OUR COMMUNITY

To commemorate Crime Victims' Rights Week, NYAWC hosted a community forum, called Out of the Darkness: Domestic Violence in our Community, on April 14, 2011. A panel of five experts engrossed the nearly 100 audience members in a discussion of coordinated responses that the community—as individuals, employers, law enforcement agencies, and service provider organizations—can take to prevent abuse and effectively assist survivors.

NYAWC presented clips of two art pieces on domestic violence's pervasive effect on victims' lives, including while at work. The film, *Telling Amy's Story*, told the true story of one

woman's deadly experience with domestic violence, while *Workplace*, a multimedia installation created by local artists and NYAWC, captured NYAWC clients' accounts of abuse.

"We believe it takes a village to prevent or reduce domestic violence," said Executive Director Larry Lee. "This forum begins the process of engaging all parts of the community in standing up and speaking out against violence and abuse."

"WE ARE NEW YORK" INTRODUCES NEW ENGLISH CONVERSATION GROUP

Through the New York City-sponsored We Are New York Community Project, NYAWC conducted weekly English conversation groups for women to practice their language skills, and to learn and build confidence. Every Thursday from 4 to 6 pm in NYAWC's Elmhurst community office, women of

varied English levels met with facilitators Andrea Yee and Jason Wu. Together, they watched videos, looked at pictures and studied vocabulary words provided by We Are New York and held discussions to practice English. The group ran from April through June 2011.

SPOTLIGHT: NYAWC'S MULTILINGUAL HOTLINE

NYAWC's 24/7 Multilingual Hotline is more than a phone number. It is a lifeline for mothers and children, and is often the only way for women who are in domestic violence situations to reach out for help. What was once a single phone line is now a complex phone system that will connect callers to NYAWC's five community offices. Every year, the Hotline receives over 6,000 calls from New York City and throughout the country. It provides support to abused women and validates their experiences. When abused women seek help, NYAWC's 1-888-888-7702 number gives them the resources they need to live safely and independently.


