SURVIVORS STRIVE TOWARDS THE AMERICAN DREAM

To help domestic violence and human trafficking survivors find respite in the U.S., NYAWC launched the Carat Program through funding from the New York City Department of Youth and Community Development (DYCD). Representing gold, the "Carat" symbolizes the richness of America that immigrant survivors would have the chance to attain through the program.

With the \$93,822 contract for the first year of the program, NYAWC hired an immigration attorney with Chinese language skills to help secure the necessary visa or immigration relief document that will allow survivors to remain in the U.S. Because of the in-house attorney, NYAWC clients will be able to access legal immigration relief services more easily. The comprehensive Carat Program will also offer counseling and other core intervention services, as well as trauma-sensitive yoga and ESL classes.

"We've all heard the horror stories," says DYCD Commissioner Jeanne B. Mullgrav. "Young men and women put their trust in someone who promises to help them live out their American Dream but turns it into a nightmare. These immigrants not only fear physical violence and intimidation, but also the threat of deportation if they turn to an authority for help. Working with the New York Asian Women's Center, we will help victims of human trafficking and domestic violence find shelter, obtain counseling and work toward legal status, so they can begin building a life here in NYC."

NYAWC is thankful to DYCD for its foresight in offering this possibility of integrated services.

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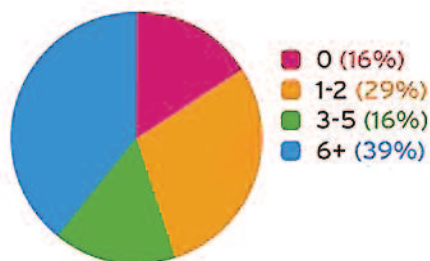
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YOUR DOMESTIC VIOLENCE EXPERIENCE: SURVEY RESULT

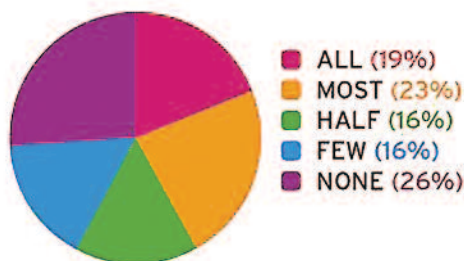
In our June 2011 issue, we asked about your experience with domestic violence. Here are the results of the survey. Thank you to those who participated.

How many domestic violence (DV) survivors do you know?

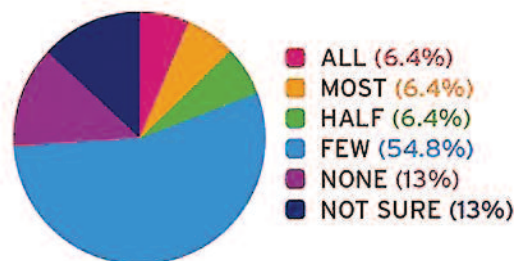


TOTAL RESPONDENTS: 31

Of the DV survivors you know who may have needed assistance, how many did you approach to help?



How many of the DV survivors whom you know sought help (from people, organization, police, etc.)?



Over 80% of respondents knew of at least one domestic violence survivor, but more than 25% did not approach any survivor to help. Only about 6% indicated that all of the survivors they knew sought help.

VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES: WE NEED VOLUNTEERS!

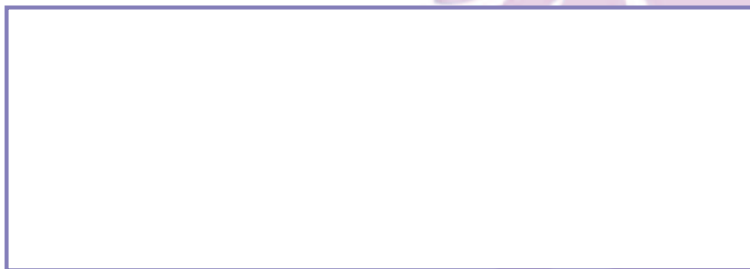
NYAWC has some unique opportunities for volunteers to make a difference. Right now, NYAWC can use your help in these critical areas:
