NYAWC Sponsors Holly Film Screening to Highlight the Tragedy of Human Trafficking

"Holly," a fascinating film about the horrors of human trafficking, was screened by the New York Asian Women's Center (NYAWC) on May 1st. at the Quad Cinema in Manhattan. The private screening was opened by Councilman John Liu, who acknowledged the importance "of the work that the New York Asian Women's Center does around human trafficking." He then presented former staff member Anita Gundanna with a citation for co-founding Project Free, NYAWC's program to serve human trafficking survivors. After the film, guests participated in a Q&A session with Guy Jacobson, writer and producer, Adi Ezron, producer and actress, Ivy O. Suriyopas, staff attorney for the Asian American Legal Defense and Education Fund (AALDEF), William Livermore from LexisNexis, and Anita Gundanna.

Human trafficking --a form of modern-day slavery-- is close to the heart of NYAWC's mission. It is the fastest growing criminal industry in the world. Roughly 17,000 victims enter major cities such as New York every year.

"Holly" was inspired by Guy Jacobson's trip to Cambodia in 2002. Horrified by girls as young as five soliciting him for sex, he gave them money and left. For the film, says Jacobson, "I picked one girl, as I could not tell the story of the 2.5 million victims. I wanted to tell it from the side of the victim."

Concerned audience members asked what they can do to help. The panel suggested that they donate money to organizations like NYAWC to support programs that directly address human trafficking. Additionally, Bill Livermore asked the audience to contact their state leaders, urging them to pass strict laws penalizing offenders.

The panel also attended NYAWC's reception at New York University's Asian Pacific American Institute.

Family Justice Centers

On July 15, 2008, Mayor Michael R. Bloomberg officially opened the New York City Family Justice Center in Kew Gardens, Queens. As a public-private partnership of the Mayor's Fund to Advance New York City, the Family Justice Center will work towards reducing barriers faced by victims of domestic violence who are seeking help.

Based on the NYC Family Justice Center's success in Brooklyn, the program will further increase the effectiveness of service delivery to break the cycle of violence in Queens.

In 2007, NYAWC was recognized for outstanding client service and collaboration with the New York City Brooklyn Family Justice Center. NYAWC will be partnering again with this innovative program in Queens to enable victims to meet with prosecutors, speak with trained counselors, and apply for housing and financial assistance all in their native language. With each new collaboration, NYAWC continues to combat domestic violence and help branch out additional centers in other boroughs.

Hitting Home

Thanks to funding from the Child Welfare Fund and the Asian American Federation, NYAWC has launched a new program called Hitting Home which will build a bridge between NYAWC and child welfare agencies. Through this partnership, NYAWC will provide assistance to child welfare agencies that are struggling with domestic violence issues. NYAWC will also be able to learn from the child welfare agencies' perspective, interventions, strategies and resources.

There is a strong correlation between the clients that are served at a child welfare program and the clients that are served at a domestic violence program - in fact, they often have the same clients. Both programs provide counseling, case management and advocacy as well. Despite the overlap, up until now, there has not been a program that aims to increase collaboration between the two. The NYAWC may be the first program in the nation to develop as a collaboration. Our partners include the Chinese-American Planning Council, Lower East Side Family Union, the Center for Family Life in Sunset Park, the Chinatown YMCA, and the Child Center of New York.

NYAWC will supply the tools to the partnering child welfare programs encountering domestic violence issues with a focus on preventing foster care placement among Asian American families. Clients referred by child welfare programs will be offered

Spotlight on Clients' and Volunteers' Experiences

Susan's Journey Home

Since moving to the U.S. in 2006, Susan has suffered from consistent physical, psychological, financial, and verbal abuse by her husband, as well as her brother-in-law and his family. Her two children have also been verbally abused by their father and have an open Administration for Children's Services (ACS) case against him.

In 2007, Susan's husband and his brother threatened to hurt her and commit her to a psychiatric institution if she did not give them her identification and immigration documents. When Susan refused, her husband held her by the neck and threw her against the wall while her brother-in-law damaged all her personal belongings.

She reported the incident to the police, and in October 2007 moved into NYAWC's shelter. There she obtained counseling and advocacy on a weekly basis, and continues to do so even after moving out of the shelter in March 2008. Through classes found by NYAWC, Susan's language skills have progressively gotten better. Susan's self-sufficiency and self-esteem continues to improve tremendously as a result of NYAWC's support. With the help of the NYAWC staff, she even initiated a criminal suit against her brother-in-law to seek justice.

Similarly, the lives of her children have improved and they are adapting well to school. At the same time, Susan was given New York City Housing Authority (NYCHA) priority as a domestic violence victim. She found an apartment and moved into her new home in April. Susan recently called NYAWC and thanked all the staff who helped her tirelessly for the past few months.

Language of Smiles

Uzma has a passion for helping children. So when her cousin, an elementary school teacher, told her about the New York Asian Women's Center, she seized the opportunity to work with children from abusive homes.

Every week, Uzma supervises children at one of NYAWC's shelters as they play games and create artwork.

"No child should be deprived of his or her childhood," she says about her motivation for volunteering. "At NYAWC, they play and have fun and express themselves. They get detached from their situation, at least for an hour; they live their childhood."

Uzma, in turn, points out the childhood memories she relives while volunteering. "It's so much fun! It brightens up my day when the children laugh. The children have the greatest imaginations. They invent games, one of them even invented a secret language."

So in addition to the other work Uzma does for NYAWC - shelter coverage during staff meetings, translating for a client, Uzma plans to indefinitely continue her work with the children.



Our children have had difficult lives. They have seen or heard their father abuse their mother. Sometimes they blame themselves for the violence. Sometimes they are forced prematurely to be adults. Sometimes they are torn, loving both Mom and Dad. When they move to shelter they are always thrust from their home, always forced to give up their friends, and always required to change schools. We will use the donation to decorate our shelter turning it into a warmer, culturally appropriate, soothing place for our children to feel happy as well as safe."
